Senate Advances its FY 2024 Appropriations Bill While House Bill Stalls: Endocrine Society Continues to Advocate to Protect NIH, CDC from Funding Cuts

On July 27, the Senate Appropriations Committee released a summary of the fiscal year (FY) 2024 appropriations bill that funds NIH and other federal public health agencies; the bill was then approved by the full Committee, placing the Senate ahead of the House in the process of finalizing FY24 funding levels. Taking a drastically different approach relative to their counterparts in the House, Senate appropriators provided \$47.8 billion for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), or a \$943 million increase over the current fiscal year.....<u>Read More</u>

Rising costs have made access to affordable insulin far more difficult for people with

diabetes, especially low-income individuals, those on high deductible health plans,

beneficiaries using Medicare Part B to cover insulin delivered via pump, Medicare beneficiaries in the Part D donut hole, and those who turn 26 and must transition from their
